PISTOL & RANGE REPORTS

SHOTGUN RANGE

The shotgun range includes the old trap house and a more modern raise able trap house so it can be shot from different heights, positions and is remote controlled. This runs on solar power and batteries. Any shotgun with small shot loads can participate here. There are four consistent shooters, shooting once a week on average. The scheduled time is Saturday and Wednesday mornings unless the range is booked for an event. The increased cost of shells and the shortage of reloading supplies has affected our numbers. In previous years we had as many as 12 shooters on a

Saturday.

The club provides the clays at a cost of \$ 4.00 a round of 25 and members provide their own ammunition (target loads).

Maintenance this year included replacing the 24 volt batteries and cables.

The rifle range consists of a metal roof with target props at 25m, 50m, 100m, 200m, 300m, 400m, 500m, 600m, 700m and 800m. There are benches and rests available at the shooting shed.

The rifle shooting shed

roof was replaced with metal roofing in May with the help of many volun-

In June we had our 3rd annual Fun .22 Shoot where the events consisted of shooting a .22 rifle at golf balls, metallic silhouettes and balloons. We gave away a .22 caliber Ruger American rifle by draw to Ray Pitton.

BLACK POWDER RANGE

April's Spring Fling had 11 adult shooters, 1 junior and the income was \$170. May was the range cleanup with the Kamloops Fire Centre doing danger tree assessment and fuel management training - repairs were made to 600 and 800 meter gongs. In June there was the Black Powder Cartridge Silhouette Shoot which had 12 shooters, and made \$615.21.

In August was our big Rendezvous and the Heffley Creek Gun Club brought in \$2975 in camping fees. The Fort Shoot and the Sunday Heffley Trail Shoot brought in \$440. In October the gun club bought a 40' container for the storage of the Black powder silhouettes at a cost of \$3500. Tractor repairs are a major hurdle (due to age) and parts are difficult to get. It is now running well and we're looking for possible replacement. It was an enjoyable year at the range. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all. ~ Gun Club Black Powder Director Neil Gervais.

COWBOY RANGE

The cowboy range consists of multiple stages at which the shooter is challenged by multiple shooting environments. Each stage is separate from the next and the combined score of all the stages determines the winner of the event. After 20 yrs of service, the Gulch is slowly getting new house props. The jail and the church has been dismantled and the new jail building with roofs and all is up. The jail cell itself needs to be altered and installed. The church is built and stored at the site and needs to be put up in May. More updates need to done in the future and everything is being built so that it can easily be moved to a new location as eventually we hope to have one firing line and Gulch as we know it will no longer be used for Cowboy.

MEMBER TAKES 1ST AT CANADIAN CHAMPTIONSHIP

Heffley Creek Gun Club member Jacquie Brown won the 2015 Canadian Silhouette Hunting Small Bore Rifle Championship July 4, 5 & 6th at Prince George BC this past year.

She took first out of her masters class of 16 competitors with a score of

107 points, beating the next competitor by 6 points.

Silhouette shooting is a form of recreational gunplay in which shooters fire at metallic outlines, or "silhouettes," of various animals. The usual selection of targets includes a small metallic chicken (one-fifth the size of the actual animal), a pig, a turkey and a ram.

The challenge for this game is you've got to shoot it freehand, free-standing -- so no slings and no supports.

HEFFLEY CREEK GUN CLUB SAFETY RULES

- Treat every firearm as if is loaded. NEVER ALLOW A FIREARM TO POINT AT YOURSELF OR AT ANYONE ELSE.
- 2 Every time you handle a firearm, for any reason, check to see that both the chamber and the magazine are empty.
- 3 All firearms when not on the firing line will have the action open, chamber and magazine empty.
- 4 Firearms will be carried with the muzzle pointing up. If this not practical then the muzzle pointing down. Firearms will not be carried in a horizontal position.
- 5 A red flag means the range is hot and firing is in progress. A green flag means the range is safe and you may go ahead and set targets, set steel etc. All firearms must be unloaded and removed from the firing line before anyone goes ahead of the firing line. Do not handle your firearms while anyone is ahead of the firing line. Do not change a flag until you are sure it is safe to do so.
- 6 Loading will be done on the firing line with the barrel pointing down range. Muzzleloaders are an exception and will be loaded behind the line. Priming and capping will be done on the firing line with the barrel pointing down range.
- 7 If a firearm becomes inoperable on the firing line it will be unloaded and removed from the line. If because of a jam or for some other reason it cannot be unloaded in a reasonable amount of time, then after alerting the other shooters, it may be removed from the firing line and taken to a safe place to be worked on. When a firearm is being unloaded in the manner care must be taken to keep the barrel pointing in a safe direction at all times.
- 8 When two or more people are at a range, then one of them will assume the duty of RANGE OFFICER. This is usually the first to arrive, or may be by mutual consent. It is the duty of the range officer to make sure that all safety and range rules are obeyed, that flags are set and shooting progresses in a safe and orderly manner. Range officer duties may be transferred to another person at any time. If the current range officer is ready to leave a range then someone else must take that person's place.
- 9 Your target must be in front of your shooting position, no cross firing is allowed.
- 10 Keep your finger off of the trigger until you are ready to fire.
- 11 Eye and Ear protection must be worn by all persons when on a live Range.
- 12 When you arrive at the range check the signs to make sure the range you plan to use is open. If it is not, then go to the range that the signs indicate is open and find out if it is in use. Do not change any signs until you have made sure it is safe to do so. DO NOT FIRE ON A CLOSED RANGE.
- 13 Drinking alcoholic beverages or being under the influence when engaged in shooting activities is strictly forbidden.
- 14. Absolutely no shooting of jacketed ammo at steel targets at less than 10 meters.
- 15. Any persons observed breaking a Range or Safety Rule and who is unwilling to correct their behavior is subject to disciplinary action by the Club Executive. Persons involved with infractions such as theft, hunting or vandalism will be reported to the appropriate authorities immediately.

These are general rules and apply to everyone during normal range operation. Organized events may have other rules so make sure you attend safety meetings. READ AND OBEY ALL POSTED RULES AND SIGNS.

In 1983 a handful of target shooters held a meeting to draw up plans for a target shooting facility and established the Heffley Creek Gun Club.

So began an association of target shooters sharing common interest. Some primary responsible individuals were Jack Walton, Elmer Hart and Norval Card.

Our club was registered under the societies act on the 19th day of July 1983, making it an official non-profit organization. Objectives are to provide club facilities for the use of our club members, and promote responsible use of firearms. The Club attracts people from all walks of life, with members aging from 12 years old to some 80+ years of age.

The facilities consist of a shotgun tower and trap house, a covered 200 meter Pistol range, a Black powder range with several trails, a Cowboy action shooting facilities, and a covered 500 meter Rifle Range with 10 benches. Our facilities host many years of popular Black Powder "B.C. Rendezvous", Cowboy Action Shooting events, and Smallbore and High Power Canadian National Silhouette Championships.

Currently our membership is over 400 members. The membership fees are amongst the lowest in B.C. and include \$5,000,000 liability insurance. The range is located 4 km from the Heffley Creek store traveling east on the Sun Peaks -Todd Mountain road, and from there you turn left onto Sullivan Valley road and drive approximately 2 km to the gun range gate.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

For 2015 the total memberships were 447 with 351 being primary, 79 spouse, 12 junior and 5 lifetime.

The discipline interest numbers as indicated on the application are: rifle 294, handgun 225, shotgun 193, black powder 67, cowboy 42 and silhouette 43.

Orientation was introduced this year - all new members and previous members that hadn't renewed in the last 2 years need an orientation before receiving their card and key for membership.

There were 117 new members with 67 orienta-tions.

For 2016 Memberships there has been a fee increase of \$20 for primary with no change for spouse or dependent children living at the same address.

For 2016 the membership

card is now a permanent card with your name printed on the front and the membership number on the back.
